

Those involved in the various groups of Codarts Research have the following tasks and responsibilities:

- Executive Board: the chair of the Executive Board also chairs the Research core team and has power of decision with regard to the budget, human resources policy, and content;
- Research Office: the research office consists of a head and a secretary. They perform supporting duties for the research groups, the research fund, the postdocs, and the PhD students. The research office plans meetings, draws up the agenda for the various meetings, takes down the minutes, takes part in network gatherings, prepares a detailed budget for Codarts Research, drives the various research policy documents and is responsible for the communication about the practice-oriented research at Codarts via the intranet, the Codarts website, and the internal newsletter 'Research'. The research office is also responsible for the quality assurance of Codarts Research. The research office has no tasks in terms of research content;
- The Research Groups consist of three professors and the members of their 'knowledge circle'. The research groups all have their own research programme. The research groups are responsible for the research that is conducted within that programme. Their tasks include project management, financial management, human resources, and quality assurance. They also coach PhD researchers who conduct research as part of their research programme. The professors are members of the core team Research, the programme committee Research, and the Research Fund;
- depending on the nature of the application, the Research Fund gives staff and students of Codarts the opportunity to do research for six months up to a year. Applicants submit a proposal and the committee assesses these proposals and takes care of the coaching of the researchers whose proposals have been accepted.
- PhD students: PhD students are responsible for their own PhD process. They plan their meetings with the coaching team. External candidates must plan a meeting with the head of the research office every three months to discuss any problems and possible solutions. Within Codarts itself, teachers and other staff members have the opportunity to take their doctoral degree with practice-oriented research in the field of the performing arts, dance therapy or music therapy. The PhD policy lists the conditions for this. There are two trajectories for obtaining a PhD:
  - internal PhD trajectories are taken by staff members who wish to obtain their doctoral degree on a subject that fits in with the research programme of one of the research groups. These PhD researchers are internally coached by a Codarts professor who may also serve as co-supervisor;
  - external PhD trajectories are taken by staff members who do research on a subject that is not within the domain of one of the three research groups. These researchers are not coached by a Codarts professor, but by external researchers.
